Notes:

1. ACT or SAT score reports are **not** required from new freshmen who are age 21 or older by the first day of classes.
2. Special students who wish to become degree-seeking students must submit a UW System Application for Undergraduate Admission, the application fee and official educational records after completing six credits of course work before they will be permitted to enroll in additional courses.
3. If applying as a Youth Options or a High School Special Student, contact your high school for additional application requirements.
4. Beginning the first day of classes and with the instructor's permission, auditors may enroll in lecture type classes on a space available basis. Distance education classes are not available to auditors.
5. Unofficial transcripts may be required to prove completion of prerequisite course work.
6. If you have previously attended UW-Waukesha or another UW College, this fee is exempt.

Academic Advising

Before enrolling for classes in **PRISM**, all students are encouraged to meet with an academic advisor. Check your **PRISM** account to find out your advisor.

Holds in PRISM

Many of the holds placed on student accounts in **PRISM** will prevent you from enrolling in classes. You must remove these holds before you enroll in classes.

Advance Tuition Deposit

All students are required to pay a \$100 Advance Tuition Deposit (ATD) prior to registration. ATD is not a fee, but an advance payment applied to your tuition. The ATD is a financial commitment to pay tuition and fees.

Enrollment

Students enroll in classes and make all class schedule changes using **PRISM**. The link to **PRISM** is on the campus Web site:

waukesha.uwc.edu

Early Enrollment - Wed., April 8-Sun., April 19

Degree-seeking students are eligible for Early Enrollment. You will be assigned an enrollment appointment date and time thru **PRISM**. You may enroll anytime after your enrollment appointment.

Open Enrollment - Begins Mon., April 20

Students who were eligible for early enrollment can continue to enroll and change schedules. If you are a non-degree seeking student at UW-Waukesha, you are eligible to enroll during this time.

Auditors - Enrollment begins on the first day of classes and requires faculty permission. Come to Student Services to enroll in a class as an auditor.

High School Special and Youth Options - Students enroll on a space available basis. Contact the Student Services Office for more information.

New Freshmen and Transfer Students - Information regarding Placement Testing, Advising and Registration will be mailed to all new students.

No Show Policy If you do not attend the first class session and haven't contacted your instructor by e-mail, phone or mail, you will be dropped from the course. If you attend none of your first class sessions, you will be withdrawn from UW-Waukesha and will forfeit your \$100 Advance Tuition Deposit.

Schedule Changes

Adding a course - Students may add courses during enrollment periods based on availability. Once the semester begins, students must have faculty permission to add a course.

Dropping a course - Students may drop courses until the drop deadline **Wednesday, November 11**. The drop deadline for short-term courses is different. Refer to the class schedule (pages 8-25) for specific dates.

Withdrawing - means you are dropping all classes for a semester. Students may withdraw from all classes through PRISM, by submitting a completed withdrawal form to the Student Services Office, sending a signed letter or FAX to (262) 521-5530 or sending an e-mail using your UW-Waukesha e-mail account by the withdrawal deadline **Wednesday, November 11**. The withdrawal will be effective the date the letter is postmarked or FAX or e-mail is received.

Do not simply stop attending classes - If you enroll for classes and stop attending, you are liable for full tuition and you will receive a failing grade (F) for the class(es).

Refunds - See the refund schedule (page 3) or contact the Business Office at (262) 521-5441. The Advanced Tuition Deposit is not refundable after June 30, 2009.

Applying for Financial Aid

Submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) for the 2009-2010 academic year as soon after January 1 as possible. Apply by April 15 to receive funding priority. You must apply for financial aid each year. Special students including second-degree students are not eligible. A minimum of six credits is required each semester. See the UW-Colleges Web site: www.uwc.edu/financial-aid/ for more information about financial aid or call Student Services at (262) 521-5040.

- ◆ **Satisfactory Academic Progress** - A student must meet the minimum GPA and successfully complete 2/3 of the credits they attempt to keep financial aid. See the UW Colleges web site for more information.

- ◆ **Registration Deadline for Financial Aid Eligibility (Census Date)** - Financial aid for fall 2009 will be based upon the number of credits you are registered for on **Thursday, September 10 at 6 pm**. If the UW Colleges has received your financial aid application on or before that date. **Students who add credits after September 10 will not receive additional financial aid.**

- ◆ Most financial aid will be disbursed electronically. Excess financial aid will be mailed to the student's home address as listed in PRISM. You should check the account balance in PRISM to ensure tuition has been paid in full by Sept. 16.

Fall, 2009 Tuition Fees

Tuition for Online Courses

Audit-only

Audit-only students must have the instructor's permission before registering. The estimated fee schedule for resident audit courses is \$55 per credit. Wisconsin residents age 60 or over may audit courses at no charge. However, special course fees may apply. If enrolled for both credit and audit courses, all credits will be assessed at the credit rate.

Parking

Payment Options

1. Make checks payable to: UW-Waukesha
Pay in person at the campus Business Office. After hours, place your payment in the FEE DROP BOX located to the right of the Business Office counter. Please include the student's name and Student ID number on the check.

Payment **must be received** by the Business Office by the payment deadline. Payments will be credited to your account the same day they are received. Check your **PRISM** account to verify a mailed check was received.

3. **Credit card payments can only be made online through PRISM.** MasterCard and Discover credit cards are accepted. A \$15 convenience fee will be added per payment.

4. Electronic check payments may be made online through your **PRISM** account at no additional charge.

5. A **Credit Agreement Plan** is available to eligible students allowing payment to be extended over a period of time. The agreement requires a total of \$200 paid towards tuition and completion of the Credit Agreement form from our website: waukesha.uwc.edu, complete it and bring it and your payment to our business office. A \$25 enrollment fee will be added to the account. The Credit Agreement Contract is effective during all enrollment periods at any UW-Colleges campus.

6. Pell, WHEG and Stafford loans should appear in PRISM on Sept. 11, 2009. Check your **PRISM** account after that date to ensure financial aid has paid tuition in full. If **PRISM** shows a balance due, students may use any method described above to pay the balance (or use the Partial Payment Plan) by the deadline date.

7. A \$20 charge plus bank fees will be added to a student's account for checks returned for any reason. If the replacement payment is received after the payment deadline date, a \$100 Late Payment Fee will be added.

Non-payment/Under-payment

All students, including financial aid recipients, must pay their tuition in full or be enrolled in the Credit Agreement Plan by the payment deadline or a \$100 Late Payment Fee is charged.

Advance Tuition Deposit Due Before You Register

All students are required to pay a \$100 Advance Tuition Deposit (ATD) prior to registration. The ATD is not a fee, but an advance payment applied to your tuition. The ATD is a financial commitment to pay tuition and fees.

Can I register without paying the ATD?

PRISM will not allow you to register until you pay the \$100 ATD. (After you pay your \$100 ATD, it may be a few hours before you can actually register in PRISM.)

The ATD is a commitment.

When you pay the ATD and register for classes you are considered financially committed to UW-Waukesha. If you want to drop all your classes, you must officially withdraw or you will owe full tuition and fees. You will not be withdrawn for not paying your tuition. (See Schedule Changes - Withdrawing on page 2)

Are there any exemptions?

Online students, Youth Options Program students, Senior Auditors (over 60) and Old Age Survivors and Disability Insurance students are exempted. In extreme cases students with a financial hardship may request an exemption from paying the ATD. Contact the Business Office at 262-521-5441 for more information.

How do I make a payment?

You may pay your ATD by cash, check or money order at the business office or by credit card or electronic check via PRISM.

Can I get a refund?

The ATD is refundable if you withdraw from all classes by June 30, 2009 for the fall term. If you withdraw on or after July 1, 2009, you forfeit your \$100 ATD.

Degree-seeking continuing students and admitted transfer and re-entry students are eligible to enroll in **PRISM**.

Holds - Students with holds will not be allowed to enroll until the hold has been removed. Check **PRISM** to see if you have a hold on your record.

Students who are not seeking a degree from UW-Waukesha may enroll during open enrollment. In addition, degree-seeking students may continue to enroll and make schedule changes.
